My extra cheques are in the desk in my study, so I go into the house to my desk where I find the cup of coffee I'd been drinking.

I'm going to look for my cheques but first I need to push the coffee aside so that I don't accidentally knock it over. The coffee is getting cold, and I decide to make another cup. As I head toward the kitchen with the cold coffee, a vase of flowers on the worktop catches my eye – the flowers need water.

I put the coffee on the worktop and discover my reading glasses that I've been searching for all morning. I decide I better put them back on my desk, but first I'm going to water the flowers. I put the glasses back down on the worktop, fill a container with water and suddenly spot the TV remote control. Someone left it on the kitchen table.

Is that our very own local frog?

Everyone knows that Kuranda is a Males and females are generally a special place to live. And as if to confirm that, several years ago Dr Conrad Hoskins, an evolutionary biologist, discovered that we have our very own frog species, Litoria myola, found nowhere else in the world. Since it's limited to 12 known breeding sites, totalling 3.5 square kilometres, all contained within a tiny part of our Kuranda area and estimated at only 700 individuals (2009) it's listed as critically endangered on the world IUCN Red List. Found in the lower sections of streams entering the Barron River, between Kuranda, Myola, Mantaka, Kowrowa and Oakforest, it's been hopping about for roughly 10,000 years, quite new for a species.

- food source for other animals, including humans (diners are adding to frog numbers' decline)
- some are a good source of poison (if you need that sort of thing)
- all are susceptible to pollution so are good indicators of water quality and habitat health (think about use of canaries in early underground mining)
